
To create cultural events for the community, to encourage community talent and appreciation for all phases of the arts, and provide an uplifting atmosphere of community spirit and harmony.

Economic History in the Mid 20th Century

With the election coming different stories are being published about Nation and the economy. As a Great Depression baby my memory is different than some proposing their own history.

Checking historical records including data from the Bureau of Labor Statics, after the ðWar to End All Warsö meaning WWI, the 1920 unemployment rate in the U.S. was 3.2%. In Dec., 1928, unemployment was 4.2%. After the 1929 stock market crash, unemployment in 1930 rose to 8.7%. In 1932 the rate of unemployed was 23.6% and then dropped to 21.7% in 1934. In 1933, the statics show that 25% of the working population was unemployed; however, 37% of all nonfarm workers were unemployed nation wide.

Which means urban workers faced greater unemployment.

In addition to the economy, during the 30ø the Nation faced natural catastrophes. In 1930 hail destroyed wheat crops and from 1932 thru 1935 there wasö unrelenting droughtö.

Even with the establishment of various programs which involved presidential executive orders and laws passed by congress such as the Federal Emergency Relief Administration plus federal programs such as the W.P.A. (Works Progress Administration), and C.C.C. (Civilian Conservation Corps.) unemployment in 1936 was 16.9 % and increased to 19% in 1938.

In 1937, I was sent to live with my Grandparents and Uncle and Aunt on a farm. Mom and Dad stayed in Chicago trying to make a living. Mom was a ðRegistered Nurseö meaning she graduated from an accredited Nursing School and passed the State Nursing Exam and received a License to practice nursing. She earned \$1.00 a day. Dad was unemployed (as the State would say), taking whatever work was available. After manufacturing jobs became available in 1941, I returned home. Farm life was a found memory. Pitching hay was a family event; we had a picnic and home-made root beer. The horses that pulled the wagon got a portion of corn. We always had food on the table.

To quote a person who was a C.C.C. member--Beans were served in seven ways (1) plain beans, (2) fancy beans, (3) bean salad, (4) bean soup, (5) beans with chili, (6) beans without chili and (7) bean sandwiches. He went on to say ðWe have yet to see them (beans) served in pancakes. We don't have beans for breakfastö.

The war in Europe caused the manufacturing industry in the U.S. to grow. In 1940 unemployment dropped to 14.6 % and after Dec.7, 1941, the 1942 unemployment figures dropped to 4.7%.

The unemployment figures change and the change depends on many factors. In 1946, unemployment was 3.9% and in 1948 it was 3.8%. In 1950, unemployment went up to 5.3%. However, in 1974, it was 7.2%, but in 1982 it was 10.8% and from the 90ø unemployment ranged between 7.3% to 7.4%. In 2009 it was 9.9% and has dropped every year since than.

If anyone wishes to review history please check two sources that I found interesting; the first, *Wikipedia* about ðThe Great Depressionö and *encyclopedia.com* ðFarmers and The Great Depressionö.

For those of you that lived during that time and remember; thank those who raised us during a difficult time!! Thank you Mom and Dad, Grandpa and Grandma, Uncle Ed and Aunt Tracie.


