SCIENCE 101: the history of life on earth

How life on Earth got started, no one really knows. From 4.6 to 4.0 billion years ago, the surface of the Earth was molten lava under heavier meteor bombardment. Early on, about 4.5 BYA, Earth was struck by another planet which scientists have named Theia, sending debris into orbit around the Earth which eventually coalesced into the moon. The gravitational pull of the moon stabilized the Earth's fluctuating axis of rotation and set up conditions on Earth in which life formed. The first signs of life, simple cells called prokaryotes, appear in the fossil record 3.6 BYA. It is quite astonishing to scientists that life appeared on Earth only 400 million years after the crust solidified. Complex cells (eukaryotes) developed two billion years ago, and multi-cellular life came along one billion years ago. The first simple animals appear in the fossil record 600 MYA (million years ago). This was followed by fish at 500 MYA, land plants at 475 MYA, insects at 400 MYA; amphibians at 360 MYA; reptiles at 300 MYA; mammals at 200 MYA; birds at 150 MYA; and primates at 60 MYA.

Man is the late comer in this progression of life. Great apes first appear in the fossil record 20 MYA, but human predecessors, the genus Homo, appear in the fossil record 2.5 MYA. Anatomically modern humans have existed for only the past 200,000 years.

Thus, bacteria have lived on Earth for approximately 3.6 billion years, whereas humans have been around for only 200,000 years. In other words, with respect to life on Earth, we have been here only .0055% of the time. That's one-half of one-thousandths of 1%.

Bacteria have been around for so long and they exist in such an abundance that they are arguably the dominant life form on Earth. Forty million exist within a gram of soil. And a million live within a milliliter of fresh water. The approximate number of bacteria of Earth is a 10 followed by 30 zeros. And their combined weight exceeds that of all plants and animals combined.

Within the human body, each of us has approximately 10 trillion cells, but we have 100 trillion bacteria living on our skin and inside of our bodies. Thus, we are arguably 90% other life forms.

Most of the bacteria living within our bodies is beneficial. Without them, we could not digest our foods. But once in a while harmful bacteria enter and reek havoc, causing illness and sometimes death. We fight these with other good bacteria such as penicillin.

Chances are, bacteria will be around long after we are gone.




